Oratorical and Essay Contest Season 2018 – submitted by Gary Munson

Optimism is reaching into the schools in Platteville and the surrounding area with the Optimist International's Essay and Oratorical contests. Again this year, our club is working with the Platteville Area Noon Club to encourage students to make the effort to put their optimism into essays and speeches. Christine Storlie from the Noon Club and Gary Munson from our Club are heading the project.

The Essay Contest is the first on the calendar. This year's topic is "Can Society Function Without Respect?" Twenty-three students made the effort to submit essays. The Platteville Middle School sent 19 essays and there were 4 from Iowa-Grant. We have to thank Platteville teachers Sarah Droessler and Jay Gesin, and Angie Boldt from Iowa-Grant for their efforts in promoting the contest in their classrooms. Eight cash awards are presented at the local level.

The winners are Caroline Gates, first place and Cassidy Whitney, second place. The top two essay writers were awarded one hundred dollars each. Their essays were sent to District to compete for top prize of \$2,500.

The Oratorical Contest is another opportunity for area students. This year's topic is "Where are My Roots of Optimism?" The club contest will be held in Platteville on March 8. The top two speakers will advance to the Zone 6 contest on March 17. The winner will compete at the District level on May 4 & 5 at the Kalahari Resort in Wisconsin Dells. Again this year, the District winner will be eligible to go on to the Regional and International contests. Last year's overall winner earned \$22,500 in scholarships.

All club members deserve a big "Thank You" for the support they give to these contests. The cash awards that are given to the local winners come directly from the fundraising efforts of the clubs. And, a special shout out to the members who volunteer their time and talents to help make the contests a success for the youth of the Platteville area.

Armed Forces Day*

Many Americans celebrate Armed Forces Day annually on the third Saturday of May. It is a day to pay tribute to men and women who serve the United States' armed forces.



Armed Forces Day is also part of Armed Forces Week, which begins on the second Saturday of May.

On August 31, 1949, Louis Johnson, who was the United States' Secretary of Defense, announced the creation of an Armed Forces Day to replace separate Army, Navy and Air Force Days. The event stemmed from the armed forces' unification under one department – the Department of Defense. The Army, Navy and Air Force leagues adopted the newly formed day. The Marine Corps League declined to drop support for Marine Corps Day but supports Armed Forces Day too. The first Armed Forces Day was celebrated on Saturday, May 20, 1950. Armed Forces Day is still celebrated nationwide today and is part of Armed Forces Week.
